

THE TALE OF A TEAM

During the late afternoons of September last a casual visitor to the Downs would have seen some midget footballers joyously chasing an enormous football. Their ideas on football were not in accordance with those expressed in the text-book. Each boy had but one aim - to kick the ball and chase it. By this means he hoped to catch the eyes of the Sports masters, and to win his place in the Looe Junior School Soccer XI.

Came the day of the final practice match, after which the team to represent the School in the first match was to be announced. That afternoon, at 4.15, twenty-two lads came on to the bumpy pitch with the light of battle in their eyes. This number included two stalwarts of the 1950-51 season, Richard King and Roy Richardson, each the proud possessor of a County Championship medal, and already elected joint captains of the team. The match will be long remembered by the Sports Spills, there were in plenty. Every player masters. threw himself into the thick of the fray with gay abandon. There were tumbles, miskicks, yells of rage and shouts of joy. With the final whistle there was utter and complete silence. The Sports masters went into a

huddle and then the team was announced. Eleven chests visibly expanded.

A day or two afterwards, the eleven youngsters, wearing the coveted red and white, went to Liskeard to play the Junior School. Within a minute of the kick-off, Looe had the ball in the Liskeard 'net'. The 1951-52 Season had started with a bang.

Throughout the season, week in, week out, the boys attended practice matches and pep talks. Gradually they welded themselves into a workmanlike team. The accent was on 'the team spirit'. As the season advanced their displays brought an ever-increasing number of spectators to watch them, and, by the time the season ended, the boys had covered themselves in glory, and had brought honour to their School.

He stressed the following points :-

- 2. Confidence.
 3. Team work.
- 4. Practice.

- 5. Corner kicking.
 6. Tactics from 'Throw-in'.
 7. Defensive covering.
- 8. Shouting for ball.

After the talk, to the great delight of the boys, Stan Mortensen had his photograph taken with the team. He is now considered to be an old boy of the school.

1. From Mr. Harold Stevens :- "Having seen the Looe Junior Schoolboys play in most of their games, I wish to congratulate them on their very fine record, one that will not easily be beaten. Looe were lucky to have had such capable reserves. The three boys filled the positions admirably. The strength of any team is in its team-work - not in individuals. From Mr. J.F. Harris - the father of Allen Harris :-"PLAY THE GAME, these words, used almost daily, by many people, are, I think, one of the essentials of everyday life as well as of sport. You Looe Junior Schoolboys have shown a very high standard on the football field. By playing the game you have reached your objective - GOAL. Remember that in a few years! time another objective will have to be aimed at, and I feel sure that if you continue to be good sportsmen and take the rough with the smooth, you will again win honours that will surpass those you have so justly won this season. Thank you all for the happy hours you have given to so many of us by your skill. My earnest wish is that you will continue to play the game and so hold the affections of all you meet in the years to come. Good luck to you all !"

From Raymond Bowden (ex Looe, Plymouth Argyle, Arsenal, Newcastle United and England). "..... how pleased I am to hear of the wonderful success of the Junior XI. Hearty congratulations to the boys and the very best of luck to them for the future.

My advice to any boy who is particularly keen to improve is to practise with a ball as often as possible, and to concentrate while still young on kicking well with either foot. This is most important. It is surprising that many professional footballers have only one good leg. So come on boys. practise hard and in a few years from now, who knows, some of you may even be helping to win the English Cup."

From Norman Pengelly (Ex Looe and Plymouth Argyle). He writes - "Well done boys ! I always found the following tips very useful :-

- 1. To be two-footed and also able to work the ball with both feet.
- 2. To keep your eye on the ball for the whole game and always to move into position in attack or defence before the other team threatens danger.
- 3. Train hard in order to last the whole game.
- 4. Always obey your captain.
 5. Always obey the referee without question.
- 6. Always play the game as a true sportsman.
 7. Always play the game for the team and not for yourself. Games are won by teamwork."

- T. Rees (G) "At first I didn't take much interest in football, but after I had played for the team I got in as much practice as I could. My most exciting moment was at Newquay when the Truro forwards swept through our defence. I was bewildered. The inside left shot but he was offside. Anyway I stopped the shot. My favourite footballer is Norman Chalk."
- N. Stephens (L.B.) "The making of a team is in its teamwork. I think we all work together."

- J. PARKHOUSE (R.B.) "I felt a bit nervous in the first match but confidence came afterwards. I am pretty well built for a footballer. My favourite team is Manchester United and my favourite player Stanley Mortensen."
- R. Richardson (L.H.) "I am the only boy who has represented Looe Juniors for three successive seasons."
- R. King (C.H.) "We have had many harassing moments in our matches. In the three finals our opponents were hoping to lower our colours but we completed the hat trick. Roy Richardson and I each have two Rosewarne Shield medals."
- J. Johnson (R.H.) " I am ten years old. I was nervous at first but not now, after we have become joint champions of Cornwall. Roger Davies played a grand game against Harrowbarrow. My favourite professional is Stanley Matthews."
- A. Soady (O.R.) "I was a reserve and played my first game for the School in the fourth match. Joseph and I will be eligible to play for the team next year."
 - N. Chalk (I.R.) " I started to play football when I was six. My most exciting moment was when I scored the winning goal against Carclaze. I like dribbling round my opponents. When I grow up I want to play for Blackpool. They have fine players."
 - A. Harris (C.F.) "At Newquay I was excited when our captain, Richard King, received the shield from Mr. S. P. Heath."
 - M. Moore (I.L.) "We never thought we would ever become champions of Cornwall. The best way to play is as a team and not to be selfish."
- R. Davies (O.L.) " I am looking forward to the tea
